58th Annual Meeting Minutes
Lake Beauty Bible Camp
October 31, 2020
9:30 a.m.

1. Board chair, Paul Zahasky, called the meeting to order.
2. Board chair, Paul Zahasky, welcomed the delegates in person and via zoom. He introduced Brian Alnes, executive director of LBBC as well as other board members who were present.
3. Board member Zach Kline opened the meeting with prayer.
4. Meeting agenda was reviewed. Discussed that this is the first year zoom meeting has been part of the annual meeting due to the COVID 19 pandemic. Paul Zahasky, board chair encouraged all delegates to read the staff reports. This has been a different but amazing year at LBBC and staff reports were written personally from the heart of LBBC staff. Reviewed the LBBC Mission, Vision, and Values.
5. **MSC 504** to suspend the reading of the minutes. **MSC 505** to approve 2019 annual meeting minutes.
6. Marcia Sheneberger, LBBC Bookkeeper, gave the delegate credentialing report. 25 churches are represented with 9 of 25 attending via zoom meeting, more than 25% (17 churches) needed for quorum.
7. Brad Friedlein, LBBC board treasurer, shared financial report. He shared that we ended 2019 well with \$275,482 due to a couple of end of year gifts which were not expected and put LBBC in a good position entering into 2020. Brad shared the improvement projects that happened in 2020 and can be seen in detail in the staff reports. Discussed that we had 10 SOWERS (Servants on Wheels Ever Ready) here in August and September and they worked on various projects. We are also thankful for the countless other neighbors, volunteers, and friends who have helped in 2020. The total cash in hand that has been spent to keep moving things forward is about \$85,000 this year. It is likely that this will be the first in the past 14 years that LBBC will most likely end in the red. LBBC has been blessed with good stewards of what we have and generous givers. As of this time we have not needed to use any line of credit. We have gratitude for God's generosity. Brad thanks Brian and the LBBC staff for being good stewards of resources. We are thankful that we did not have to lay off or furlough staff during the COVID 19 pandemic. We have applied and received \$104,000 for PPE loans as well as applying for grants available in Todd County. Our revenue was down \$574,000. We are approximately \$240,000 behind. LBBC will be having a matching funds drive to end the year. The goal is to reach \$180,000 by the end of December.
8. Election of New Board Members by acclamation. South Dakota District – Twila Mursu **MSC 506**; Alexandria/Wheaton District – Pastor Kendall Churchill **MSC 507**; Trimont District – Gretchen Olson **MSC 508**.
9. **Looking Back and Looking Forward ... A Time of Sharing**
 - a. Director's Report and Perspectives: Lake Beauty Ministries in 2020. Brian Alnes, Executive Director of LBBC shared that he is feeling overly blessed to have all of our staff at LBBC at this time. He states that this has been a crazy year but God has shown up in powerful ways to all of us. He states that this is a year where staff have become more of a family and that LBBC is God's camp and God was not surprised by COVID – 19. Brian shared that God has shown up in many ways during 2020.

Brian shared stories of how LBBC was blessed by various people such as the SOWERS, Mathesons, Kings, Myron Carlson, neighbors and many others. People know that LBBC is God's property and God's place and Brian talked about how camp has been blessed by many who donate equipment like a movable 25 foot lift, or give of their time, resources and finances. Brian shared that moments of others giving impact LBBC staff helping them to realize that LBBC is bigger than them and that God is in control. They see the spread of where resources come from to make ministry happen and this helps motivates them. Brian shared that he and his staff are taking time for self-care.

- b. Phil Tolbert – Program Director shared the summer theme for 2021. “Scaling the Summit: Training for the Trek” from Galatians 6:2. Phil shared how last year's theme looked at the question of “What is God's Purpose?” 2021 theme will deal with the question of “What is My Purpose” focusing on building community with one another. This is fitting theme to build cohesion in a time like this. What is a community? How do we build cohesion in a time like this? Think of a mountaineer, somebody getting ready to scale Everest in the Himalayas. Do they just pack their bags and go on a whim? No! They take the time to train, get the necessary equipment, and build a team to go with them. Scaling the Summit is difficult, time-consuming, and is mentally as well as physically draining. It is something that takes time and effort. Embarking on a journey like this requires others there to assist.

Our purpose in life is to build community with one another, love others more than ourselves, and show them, God. This summer, we will be going over how we can better prepare ourselves to serve God in a greater capacity. We will look into what a community should look like and how we can find it. Like a climber, we prepare for the trek ahead. Dates for 2021 camps are out and in annual meeting book.

- c. Dialog with Delegates. Brian Alnes and Paul Zahasky opened up the floor for any questions or discussion from the delegates. Brian shared that the hardest day of his life was the Saturday of Memorial Day weekend. He states that he was down at camp and there was no one here. He stopped and reflected about the ministry that he and his staff are a part of and how hard it was to not have traditional camp this year. He states that during this year he and his staff were able to think outside of the box. Resort status was allowed by the MN Department of Health and requirements were passed which allowed opportunity for family ministry to happen during the summer and fall. Family camp has been a key part of the ministry of LBBC. As a result there will be 7 family camp weeks next summer in addition to the youth camps. Discussion of donation of campers or motor homes to meet family camp weeks next summer was had. The delegates were encouraged to share this need that LBBC has or consider bringing their motor homes/campers to LBBC for the summer for others to use while at LBBC. Discussion was had on how blessed families had been in the past using the campgrounds while youth camps were happening. It was felt that it was time to bring family weeks to camp in addition to traditional family camps. It is unknown at this time what next summer will bring for camp but staff are preparing “Plans A – D with contingencies not knowing what will happen”. Discussion was brought forward by delegate regarding electronics at camp and looking at ways to live stream sessions of speakers so parents and families can hear what their children are hearing. This has been discussed previously by staff and discussion what that could look at. Discussion of upgrade of internet service was had. LBBC previously had 3 -5 MG and have upgraded to satellite internet and are at 30 MG now and are hoping to make use of this infrastructure in the future with programming as now they know they have a resource that can make it happen. At this time costs of youth camp will remain same.

Paul Zahasky shared with delegates that the LBBC board is usually is a policy board operating at a high level. The board did “swoop down closer to the surface” when it became clear this spring that

the pandemic would impact the ministries at Lake Beauty. The board of directors collaborated with the leadership and director staff to assess the situation and develop innovative adaptations, and alternative approaches to ministry. The primary role of the board was to reassure the Lake Beauty staff that they had our support, encourage innovation, assist with regulatory compliance, and to help develop forward looking strategies. The staff took the initiative to develop ways to share the message and love of Christ. The board moved back to a “higher level” as Brian, his director staff, and staff developed innovative adaptations of LBBC ministry during the pandemic.

- d. Plans for 2021 and beyond. Brian Alnes shared that we are moving forward. Brian thanked the current board members stating that he appreciates that they are a fun group who works hard and want people to come and experience Jesus. Brian acknowledged that Paul Zahasky has served as chair of the board for 12 of his 14 years on the board. Brian shared that his focus is to continue to look at finances, time, and resources of people. He looks to find a balance with his skills and abilities as a Pastor as well having a business background. He is super excited about his relationships with the churches and had 33 church promos on the books prior to the COVID 19 pandemic starting. He and his staff were excited about this. He continues to go out and full pulpits in member churches. He continues to strive on how he can get people to come to camp. He discussed that now with the new ropes course being completed staff will be able to have 24 individuals on the ropes course with 3 staff members. He is also looking at ways to work within the community. He is looking at ways that people will want to come to camp and do things with their friends and family. Brian shared that switching to digital format for camp evaluations has been positive. They have had a great response with people replying via email and the number one response they get is that LBBC has a great staff and they are always willing to help however they can. Brian often hears from churches that improving is the piece that gets people’s attention but LBBC doesn’t change and continues to minister. One of Brian’s financial goals is to pay cash as we go. He states that next year there will be no increases in fees. He is hoping for 60% capacity and the 2021 budget is based on this. Currently there are 7 Solid Rock students here and they are great students and all want to be here. Brian reports that staff are doing a great job and they are calling themselves family this year. They have spent time together and had Easter dinner together as they were all here. States that at this time there will be an opportunity for people to financially donate for a matching gift. People love to give to something that is bigger than their self. At this time LBBC is roughly behind \$240,000 - \$270,000. We do have some money that was given to use as needed. At this time there is a line of credit of \$150,000 at the bank and the option of loan from Covenant National Properties. At this time the line of credit has not been used but may need to be used in December 2020 or January 2021. At this time there is \$90,000 given by donors for a matching fund. Challenges are being given to member churches and donors to give between now and the end of the year as their amount donated will be matched by this fund. It is anticipated that this year will end in the red by \$50,000 - \$60,000. This has been hard as for the last 14 years LBBC has ended in the black. Brian states that LBBC is God’s camp and can provide. Brian states that a Go Fund Me page brought in \$6000 earlier this year. Brian reminded delegates that there are many options and ways on how people can be involved and donate in other ways in addition to financial support. He encourages anyone who has desire to help to call, ask, text, or email camp. Brian Alnes discussed that there were some significant changes with changing health insurance of staff members from Bethany insurance to a health share program. Staff member’s insurance coverage will not have significant changes. There was reduction of insurance cost in changing from Church Mutual insurance company to Brotherhood Mutual who covers Christian organizations.

I think the question I received the most from people this summer was, “How does it feel to have a normal camp year again?” My response was, “It’s so great to have campers, staff, and families back on property, learning more about Jesus.” The 2021 year fared drastically better than 2020, though we learned a lot from the modified summer we had prior. This year brought on a lot of uncertainties initially, but we can be reassured that God moved this summer.

Before summer began, we had the task of walking through the end of Fall and Winter retreats, which we were able to have. We hosted our Marriage and Trailblazer Winter Retreats in February, giving us a chance to open up the property for couples and kids to come and experience camp again. I remember it being so bitterly cold for the couples, though many wanted to stay inside and commune anyway!

As we moved on towards summer, my weekends began to get busy and busier. I traveled to roughly 15 churches (with others going to another 15 or so) throughout March and April, promoting summer camp/theme, what we did in the past year, and our hopes for the future. It was a fantastic opportunity to role-reverse and see many campers/families at their churches and reconnect with them.

As summer came upon us, you could see a buzz occurring around the camp property. We were hiring solid college-aged staff, campers were registering by the handfuls each day, and we were finishing up planning and prepping various activities on our end. Edgie Designs out of the greater Nashville area came back and put the finishing touches on our new Challenge Course, training in a few of our staff in the process. In addition, we hosted the 5th and 6th grades out of Long Prairie-Grey Eagle schools for a couple of Outdoor Education day trips; they were our guinea pigs on the course, and from their responses, we knew it would be a hit.

As for summer camp, we had great numbers even though we were still amid a pandemic. Luckily, the state of Minnesota lifted certain restrictions, and we were able to host camp without many barriers, still keeping camper’s safety at the forefront of our minds. We had 29 staff, mainly from the NWC, but a few who had never been to Lake Beauty before on staff. It was great to see them bond and grow as a group, as well as with campers throughout the summer.

Our numbers were a little down each week compared to when we hosted a regular summer camp in 2019. All in all, we were down about 200 campers for the whole summer – that did not stop us from reaching new heights and growth in God. Our theme, Scaling the Summit: Training for the Trek based on Galatians 6:2 had us thinking about the central idea of our purpose: to build community. Our chapel speakers hammered home each week the importance of having a community, one rooted in Christ. We had 96 first-time commitments to Christ and over 300 rededicate their lives to Him again. Praise God!

The three classic family camps – Memorial, Fourth of July, and Labor were well attended. It was great to see so many families come together again and build bonds either during chapel sessions, out on Challenge Course, or cooking together. The summer theme indeed carried from the summer camp to the family camp modes seamlessly.

We finished having over 100 Senior Adults out for a morning concert and meal and our Women’s Retreat. Both were well attended and remind me that there is always room for somebody to come and retreat with others!

We have created an abundance of new programs/activities that camp can offer in the past year.

- Our High Ropes Pole Course was complete this Spring;
 - Two separate courses, 24 and 36 ft. high for people to self-lead throughout

- Two Step-of-Faith platforms 36ft. High were people get a chance to 'freefall' towards the ground
- Two new climbing routes on a new climbing wall
- Laser tag, both indoor and outdoor areas to play
- New 6 person torpedo tube for the lake
- New Aquaglide jumping trampoline

2021 looks to end well with our Fall Quilting and many weekend groups. However, I am excited about what 2022 has in store as well. The summer theme is set, staff are coming on board for next summer, and there is still a buzz from what transpired last year.

A few things I hope to create within the next year:

- Parent/child retreats
- New 'younger' level for High Ropes Challenge Course
- Staff Alumni newsletter
- Finalizing usage of the indoor climbing equipment in the gym

I look forward to serving God in a greater capacity within my role, continually fostering relationships with staff, students, and campers along the way. Thank you again for your prayers as we continue to navigate during this uncharted time.

The atmosphere is cautiously optimistic as I speak with group leaders and guests, but very appreciative of the care and concern we provide for people during their retreats and events. We were blessed in September to host the weddings of three couples who met here at Lake Beauty! So, God continues to use this place to bring people together in creative and special ways.

Looking ahead, I anticipate a good winter season of Lake Beauty retreats and guest group weekends. We have retreats scheduled for most weekends January-early March, and good rebookings for next summer, so are thanking God for these blessings and continued opportunities to serve Him and others.

Solid Rock

Some big changes came to Solid Rock this year. Director, Emily Schmiess, ended her time at Solid Rock in September. My husband, Grant, and I were hired as the first co-directors of Solid Rock. We moved to Lake Beauty in June and spent eight weeks training with Emily. Those weeks were instrumental for Grant and me as Emily helped us understand the principles and functions of the program.

Students

Seven students graduated last May and we welcomed ten new students this school year. This year, there are five men and five women currently enrolled. This year, students have expressed that living in a community is their favorite part about Solid Rock and they enjoy spending time together in and out of class. Most days of the week, students are educated on various Christian topics by spending their time attending college-level classes taught by all returning faculty. Alongside classes, students also serve at Lake Beauty on Saturdays, participate in worship or dinners with the Lake Beauty community on Tuesdays, and volunteer at a church on Sundays and/or Wednesdays. We have some amazing local churches that have chosen to partner with Solid Rock this year: River of Life Church in Long Prairie, First Baptist Church in Long Prairie, and Grace Covenant Church in Little Falls. Each of these churches are providing a way for students to get involved and have welcomed them in as part of their church family.

This year, the students were unable to participate in the Solid Rock Leadership Experience during orientation due to forest fires in northern Minnesota. Instead, Grant and I took the students on a leadership retreat at Grant's family cabin. At this retreat, we spent time discussing disciplines such as servant leadership, shepherd leadership, and spiritual gifts. Students also were given time to apply what they learned through various team-building activities and challenges. This was a great opportunity to get to know one another out in nature! Wow what a year it has been! I think we can all agree that these past 2 years have been some of the most crazy years we've all ever lived through. This past year has also been quite the growing experience for me. In December of 2020 the ministry staff and interns were told that we were being furloughed come the new year for an undetermined amount of time. This was definitely not how I thought the new year would start off for me, but ultimately it became one of the best things that could've happened. Right before Christmas I moved home and enjoyed that time with my family. As the new year started I began looking for jobs to occupy my time until my hopeful return to camp in the summer. I ended up getting a job at Menards and worked from the beginning of January until my return to camp in May.

This time of being furloughed proved to be one of the most important times in my life that I never knew I needed. I was able to focus more on myself, my mental health, and also spend precious time with family and friends that I hadn't been able to do in years. I never thought I would say getting furloughed was one of the best experiences, but it really and truly helped me grow as a person. It showed me how much I love this ministry that I get to do and how grateful I am for Lake Beauty.

Upon my return in May it was all hands on deck to get ready for summer. Summer staff training came and went and then we were right into having summer campers back on our property again. The first day of Junior High #1 is a day I will never forget. Getting to see all of the kids pouring out of church buses and cars and stepping back onto this property for the first time in two years was something so special. These kids love camp and were so excited and happy to be back. It was a sense of normalcy for them to be here at camp. I can't think of anything better than kids and families feeling at home here. After not having a "typical" summer the year before it was so exciting to know and feel that we were getting back on track.

Now that summer has come and gone I am so excited to dive into the fall and winter seasons. Kari and I are working together to see how we can improve the foodservice here at camp. I am continually learning from her about all things on how to run a kitchen, make orders, and serve guest groups to the best of my ability. She's been an awesome teacher, and I can't wait to learn more from her. All of our staff here at camp are excited about where we are headed and hope that you will come alongside us this upcoming year.

Last fall was my first year of being a maintenance intern. Throughout the entire fall I was learning a lot of new skills and just trying to be a sponge and absorb as much information that I could.

The biggest project that I worked on was the start of the new pole course. This was a big learning curve for me, because the last time I did any type of woodworking was in the eighth grade. It was a lot of fun though, as was getting to mingle with the guys that came to help and offer their skills.

Another new experience was learning how to service various pieces of equipment, how to operate new machinery and gain new skills along the way. Driving the big John Deere tractor with the trolley during family camps is one of my favorite things to do, because not only do I get to drive a tractor, but I also get to see all the kids get excited that the tractor is coming around and to see the families having fun. Another piece of machinery I have really enjoyed while honing skills is the skid loader, just getting more comfortable with it. And, I learned how to winterize boats and outbaths. Learning about multiple things is one of my favorite things to do because then I am becoming more and more a jack-of-all-trades. I also had the chance to grow relationships with the Solid Rock students last year and got to pour into them and offer my help with their classes.

Around Christmas we were told that we were going to be furloughed from January until further notice. This was hard. I knew that this wouldn't be happening if they could possibly avoid going into major debt. Yet, going home was good and growing. I really focused on making sure to put intentional time into my relationship with God. I also really got to know my sister-in-law and be there for my Uncle Burt as he was dealing with prostate cancer. So, being furloughed was a blessing and a time of growth of which I'm thankful to have experienced.

I returned to camp in early April to continue the work of finishing the pole course for summer use. We put on the railings, the climbing wall, boxed in the bottom deck, and passed the pole course inspected by Edgie Designs.

Then I took on a new role this summer where I got to pour into the summer staffers, as well as taking leadership roles with a member of the maintenance team and with the SOWER ladies. It was difficult at first being in a leadership role, as I was worried about being able to answer questions and give clear directions to set others up for success. And, being in charge of the Sower ladies felt a bit weird because I was directing people who were older than me. That just didn't feel right, but they were amazing servants of the Lord with big hearts for camp ministry. The relationships built over the summer was a blessing.

Wrapping up the summer, I learned how to shingle a roof, back up trailers pretty decently, do plumbing, install carpet squares, and continue to improve my skills. This internship has taught me more than how to fix things, I have grown deeper in my relationship with Christ and with the community around me here at camp. I am so thankful that I am able to be around for one more whole year to be discipled and to disciple others.

At the close of December 31, 2020, we had a loss of <-348,430.00> loss in revenue final number. When we add in the year end giving and gifts the final was <-163,548.00> behind. We were able to take the loss and continue to function without borrowing from our local bank line of credit nor the line of credit extended to us from the Covenant at 0% interest for 5 years. So we had great year end giving, but we still did not meet the lost revenue completely. It is also because of the year end gift received in December of 2019 that we are where we are today. That gift was almost exactly where we needed to be to come through this and no one could have seen that in 2019. We paid payroll the last couple of months of 2020 (Sept - Dec) and after payroll and liabilities, after we made the deposits we had more money in the checkbook than before we paid payroll. Only those who understand that this camp is not ours, but God's, can understand how that all works. God has blessed us in amazing ways over these last 58 years. He is not done with this place yet. This crazy season was not a surprise to Him. We are thankful to His blessings and yours as you responded to His leading to assist.

We did receive a total of 204,000.00 in 2 PPP loans both of which have been forgiven. We are grateful for the funds that were available and that it helped to carry us through.

Christian Health Ministries, our new Med Share company for staff benefits has saved us over 40,000.00 so far this year. There have been no complaints from anyone about the switch. We still have a few things we are working through but it looks good so far.

As you will see from staff reports. There were many things that were done this past year around camp. We also were blessed with lots of volunteers. We had 6 couples throughout the summer from SOWERS (Servants on Wheels Ever Ready) this year. Several were here for multiple months. Several of the couples were also returning from past summers. Several of them again have shared interest in coming back for summer 2022. They did lots of great ministry here for us.

We are planning to work on the outbaths at Lakeside and Westwood. If there is one thing we hear about in the evaluations, it's the bathhouses. We are also going to be working on the electrical infrastructure at Westwood and Lakeside. We hear the concerns and are working to keep making improvements.

Brian and the staff truly understand that they are stewards of Lake Beauty Ministries and its facilities.
